2018 VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR

Everyday Dewey-Humboldt volunteers generously give their time and service to help others. Now here is your chance to give back by nominating a deserving individual for his/her outstanding service through the Town's Volunteer of the Year program.



Who is eligible? The nomination is open to all Dewey-Humboldt residents who have volunteered in 2018. Nominees need to have been volunteers for organizations that directly benefit the citizens of the Town of Dewey-Humboldt. The organization can be the Town Council, Town Boards/Commission/Committees, including the Planning and Zoning Commission, Open Space and Trail Committee, Firewise, Volunteers for the Town's Activity Center, the Town Library, the Historical Society, Humboldt Elementary School and other Agencies that have programs benefiting the citizens of the Town of Dewey-Humboldt.

Nomination Process: The process is simple. Please state the nominee's name, volunteer organization where the nominee volunteered in 2018 and why you believe the individual should be nominated, such as how his/her efforts volunteering in the specific organization have made a profound difference in citizens' lives. Only one nomination per submission please. **The deadline for nominations has been extended to 5 p.m. Thursday, May 16th** and can be delivered to Beth Evans at Town Hall, emailed to beth-evans@dhaz.gov, or faxed to 928-632-7365.

Honoree Selection: The Town Manager appoints a Citizen Committee to review the Nominees and make the recommendation to the Town Council. The Town Council decides whether to accept the Citizen Committee's recommendation. Nominees will be judged on their outstanding service to the citizens of Dewey-Humboldt. The Hon-

oree of the "Volunteer of the Year" Award, along with all that have been nominated, will be recognized by the Town Council at an upcoming Town Council meeting. This is a wonderful way for the Town to express its sincere appreciation for our volunteers and also a great opportunity for volunteers to inspire others through their stories.

SPRING CLEAN UP

The Town of Dewey-Humboldt will conduct its annual **Spring Clean Up Program May 28th through May 31st**. The location for drop off will be **12938 E. Main Street** in downtown **Humboldt**. The hours of operation will be from **8:00 a.m. until 6:00 p.m.**



As part of the **Town's Firewise Program**, we **will** be accepting brush and yard clippings. Dumpsters will be available to handle your discards and a separate area will be available to receive brush and yard clippings for later chipping and mulching.

The Town will be making **mulch** available on an appointment basis **beginning on Monday, June 3rd**, from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. until all of the mulch has been disposed of.

Items that **will not** be accepted are: tires, oils, hazardous chemicals, batteries, household trash, refrigerators/freezers with freon/coolant canisters attached.

To schedule an appointment for mulch pickup, please call the Town.

SPRING CHIPSEAL PROJECT

Over the next 60 days, the Public Works Department will begin the annual **Spring Chipseal Project**. The project will entail a chip overlay of existing roads throughout town with a fog (a thin liquid oil) coating once the chips are applied.

COMMUNITY WORKSHOP Visioning for Possible Future Reuse of Former Humboldt Smelter Property after Cleanup

On **May 15, 2019**, the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) will host a Community Workshop at **Humboldt Elementary School, 2750 Corral St, Humboldt**. The goal of the workshop is to discuss how the community might envision the reuse of the former Humboldt Smelter property after the Superfund cleanup. EPA has secured a contractor to help the community explore and communicate its ideas to reuse the property in the future. This will help EPA understand whether our site cleanup options would be compatible with those ideas. **This is a reschedule of the January 29th meeting, which was cancelled due to the government shutdown.**

EPA is managing the Superfund cleanup process for the Iron King Mine/Humboldt Smelter (IKHS) site. The IKHS site includes the former mine and its large tailings pile, the former Humboldt Smelter, and the contaminated gulch areas lying between them. EPA has finished our investigation of the nature and extent of site contamination and has imple-

mented cleanup of soils in residential yards where it was necessary. EPA is now working on a study of the options to clean up the contamination in the *non-residential* portions of the IKHS site. This is called a *feasibility study*.

EPA does **not** choose or pay for the future land use of properties after a cleanup. However, EPA needs to know what future land use the community might like to see so we can appropriately compare how the cleanup options would be compatible with those reuses when developing the feasibility study. This is what we will explore in the workshop.

The former Humboldt Smelter property is only one part of the site. However, the community has expressed concerns specifically about future land use at this property, after cleanup. Some ideas that have already been discussed include a historical state park, an interpretive trail, camping or other recreational spaces, and recreational sport fields. Please plan to join us!





**SPECIAL EDITION****BLUE HILLS WATER STORAGE TANKS**Community Invited to Celebrate May 22**WATER STORAGE TANKS IN PLACE FOR D-H BLUE HILLS**

On May 22, the Dewey-Humboldt community invites the general public to celebrate the completion of a long-time dream for more fire protection in the area. The dedication ceremony takes place on the site of four recently placed water storage tanks, strategically located in the Upper Blue Hills near the Green Gulch Trailhead entrance.

Each of the four tanks holds 8100 gallons of water to provide first responders with a critically-needed water supply. The tanks will be filled by water tenders that act as mobile hydrants, rather than drawing from limited ground water sources in the area.

Central Arizona Fire and Medical Authority (CAFMA) made the tanks possible. "It's

a big deal," said CAFMA's Planning & Logistics Chief Scott Bliss. Bliss was involved in the project since 2013 when it first came to CAFMA's attention, and recently worked with contractor, Earth Resources Corporation, to get it done.

According to Bliss, "Water supply for the fire fighters in the Blue Hills area has been a challenge, so it's a big part of our ability to protect lives and property."

The 5-acre property is situated about 3.5 miles west of Highway 69, reached by following Kachina Place to Henderson that becomes Newtown Road, then turning left on Merrill toward the tanks. As D-H Firewise Director Vickie Wendt said of the tanks, "You can't miss them. They're big!"

The site was first considered in 2013, after being offered as a donation to CAFMA by a Blue Hills resident. At the time, property access was a challenge and legal feasibility unknown. In the meantime,

Former Fire Chief Paul Nies, Assistant Chief Scott Bliss, and Fire Marshal Rick Chase review the location for potential construction requirements including grading and ground work, and legal feasibility of the offer. Fire Marshal Chase indicates that the matter could come before their board as early as September. Chief Nies characterizes the offer as "one of those things that doesn't come along in a lifetime."*

CAFMA took numerous measures, seeking accessibility and assessing the area for fire-risks. In July 2016, property ownership was officially transferred to CAFMA, after it was received from Central Yavapai Fire District that had held it since April 2014.

In 2015, CAFMA's fire risk assessment of the area identified significant fire potential, characterized by limited water supply and limited access in and out of this populated area, scattered across 1,222 parcels with a population of over 1,558 people.

Following the area's Goodwin Fire in 2017, D-H Firewise Director Wendt, who had assisted CAFMA with establishing an access easement to the property, asked for their help to get the tanks installed. Speaking to CAFMA's board, she said, "As a native Arizonan and a 25-year resident of the Dewey-Humboldt area, I firmly believe that when it comes to fire awareness, an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure."

CAFMA subsequently contributed \$250,000 to the project. This included purchasing and installing the tanks and filling them up. While initial plans called for two tanks, as the project progressed, an additional two tanks were made available.



Abatement/Mitigation:

The creation of defensible space around an existing structure and/ or fuel breaks on undeveloped land

FIREWISE CAN HELP WITH ABATEMENT GRANTS**2 Grants available at this time**

- County Title III grant
- PAWUIC WFHF 2018 grant

BOTH Grants Require:

- 1 acre parcels
- A CAFMA Wildland Hazard Inspection
- Property be located in a Firewise certified area (either Upper Blue Hills or Foothills East)
- Usage for brush and tree removal, thinning, and limbing of trees
- CAFMA and PAWUIC-approved lists of abatement companies from which to seek bids
- The property owner pays 10% of the cost up to the maximum grant amount (10/90).
 - ⇒ 10/90 means the property owner is responsible for 10% of the cost up to the maximum grant amount
 - ⇒ the 10% the property owner pays is recycled back into the grant to be used toward other abatement projects
 - ⇒ *should abatement cost exceed the grant amount, it is the owner's responsibility to pay the difference (see examples below)*

DIFFERENCES in each Grant:**County Title III Grant - \$2,000 10/90** [Grant is for up to \$2,000]

- Property owner pays 10% of the cost of the abatement, up to the \$2,000 capped grant amount
Example: Grant: \$2,000
Cost to abate: \$1,875 Property owner pays 10% = \$187.50
Cost to abate: \$2,300 Property owner pays 10% of first \$2,000 = \$200 + \$300 additional cost difference = \$500
- Requires a residential structure, covers up to 200 feet around the structure
- Initially provided 14 grants for either Upper Blue Hills or Foothills East.

PAWUIC WFHF 2018 Grant - \$1,500 10/90 [Grant is for up to \$1,500]

- Property owner pays 10% of the cost of the abatement, up to the \$1,500 capped grant amount
Example: Grant: \$1,500
Cost to abate: \$1,500 Property owner pays 10% = \$150
Cost to abate: \$2,600 Property owner pays 10% of first \$1,500 = \$150 + \$1,100 additional cost difference = \$1,250
- No residential structure is required
- 9 grants are available for the Upper Blue Hills
- 7 grants are available for Foothills East
