Nomination Process: The process is simple. State the Nominee's name, what work has been done as a volunteer and/or the volunteer organization where the Nominee volunteered. Briefly describe why you believe the individual should be nominated, such as how his/her efforts volunteering in the specific organization have made a profound difference in citizens' lives. Each Nominee should be submitted on a separate form. Nominations can be delivered to Town Hall via in person, U.S.P.S., emailed to bethevans@dhaz.gov or faxed to 928-632-7365. **The deadline for submissions is March 31, 2020.**

Honoree Selection: The Town Manager appoints a Citizen Committee to review the Nominees and make a recommendation to the Town Council. The Citizen Committee shall be comprised of a diverse group of individuals/organizations who are involved in the community. Members do not have to be a Dewey-Humboldt resident. One Councilmember liaison will serve on the committee as an arbitrator only. Nominees will be judged on the service performed/donated by the nominee; the amount of time and effort spent by the nominee; whether the nominee was nominated for more than one service; and, whether the nominee was nominated by more than one person for their service. After review of the nominations, the Citizen Committee will make their recommendation to the Town Council.

Recognition: The Honoree of the "Volunteer of the Year" Award, along with all that have been nominated, will be recognized by the Town Council at an upcoming Town Council meeting where they will be awarded certificates of appreciation. Nominees' guests and

GENERAL PLAN STEERING COMMITTEE VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

Public involvement is a major component of the update effort. A Steering Committee is in the process of being formed to direct the consultant's work throughout the process. Applications for the Steering Committee are available on our website or at Town Hall. Apply by March 6.

GENERAL PLAN UPDATE BEGINNING

The Town has contracted with PLAN*et to assist in the General Plan update. State Statute mandates that municipalities prepare General Plans in accordance with "Growing Smarter" legislation. These plans are comprehensive and describe the vision, goals and policies of the Town. The document identifies a staff responsibility to identify how each proposed Council action relates to the following values: Active Citizenship; Sustainable Development; Creating Community; Self-Reliance; Efficient Public Services; Limited Public Services; Durable Public Improvements.

Scope of Work

Much of the information in the current adopted General Plan mentioned above including, but not limited to, various elements, tables/charts, maps, and goals and policies are anticipated to be retained and/or updated where necessary. The Town of Dewey-Humboldt included all the following elements in our current General Plan and will be included in our update: Land Use; Circulation; Open Space/Trails; Growth Area; Environmental Planning; Cost of Development; Water Resources. Optional Elements for

Consideration: Conservation; Aggregate; Recreation; Public Buildings; Housing; Safety; Energy.

The consultant will initially, as Phase 1, be assisting the community in evaluating and appraising the effectiveness and continuing relevance of each element of the existing plan and exploring with the community any new elements needed to be added.

The results of the evaluation and appraisal from Phase 1 will be used by the firm contracted to develop the scope of work for the update of each element and the development of the new elements, including background data, analysis, and goals and objectives, as Phase 2 under separate contract.

Additionally, the consultant will provide support in recommending plan framework, coordinating facilitating citizen participation and community outreach, plan editing and drafting, data collection and analysis to support the update of each element as, including graphics and diagrams, maps, public surveying, public meetings, staff meetings and any related items that are necessary in moving the update of the General Plan forward in a manner consistent with Arizona Revised Statutes, Town of Dewey-Humboldt Laws and Regulations and in concert with the goals and policies of the Mayor and Council.

It is anticipated that additional elements may be included to support various Town goals and policies identified through this process.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT CORNER

BUILDING PERMIT REQUIREMENTS

The Town regularly receives questions on whether a building permit is needed for a structure. The easy answer is "Call the Building Official at (928) 632-7362 and find out!"

Oftentimes inquiries on zoning and permitting matters can lead to complicated scenarios, and it is not always easy to give a generalized answer. In the case of building a structure under 400 square feet, the

Town's Code of Ordinances, **Section 105.2.1**, provides that: **A building permit shall not be required for the following:**

One-story detached accessory buildings on residential properties used as tool and storage sheds, garages, carports, playhouses, animal shades, barns, and similar uses, provided the area does not exceed 400 square feet under roof and not to exceed a height of 12 feet from natural grade to the mean roof height. The site of the accessory building must meet all setbacks and requires a zoning clearance permit to verify this. Detached accessory buildings shall not be considered or used as habitable space. A separate building permit is required for any plumbing, electrical or mechanical systems in all detached buildings.

As one finds out from reading the above code, there are a great deal of variables. Just a couple of examples: commercial structures and residential structures are subject to different rules; if your barn exceeds a certain height, then it would be subject to a different set of rules. ENCROACHMENT PERMIT REQUIREMENTS

When is an Encroachment permit required? The definition of Encroachment, as per the Town's Code of Ordinances, **Section 51.15**, states: **ENCROACHMENT.** Any obstruction (whether temporary or permanent, unless expressly authorized by law), any sign, any landscaping, any new driveway, any new other road connection, the diversion of waters, any excavation (whether or not conducted under a valid franchise), culvert installations (whether new or replacement), and any other construction on or within five feet of the greater of the **ROADWAY PRISM** or the **PUBLICLY MAINTAINED ROAD**.

PUBLICLY MAINTAINED ROAD. Is defined as the entire width of the right-of-way for any road under the exclusive control of the town, whether held by deed, easement, dedication, or other claim of right, including bridges, and which have been included in the Town Road Maintenance System.

ROADWAY PRISM. Is defined as the traveled road surface, shoulders and ditches.

Section 51.16, under the Town Code of Ordinances, provides the following General Regulations:

(A) No Encroachment within a publicly maintained road is allowed without a written permit from the Public Works Supervisor, except by authorized town employees, contractors acting under a town contract, and new subdivision improvements for which the town holds financial assurances. No permittee shall violate the terms and conditions of a permit without written authorization from the Public Works Supervisor, and only when allowed by the provisions of this sub-chapter.

(B) No vehicle shall be operated, or any other activity conducted on any concrete or asphaltic concrete surface in a fashion which damages the road surface or base without a permit from the Public Works Supervisor unless the use is specifically authorized by law.

(C) No vehicle in excess of the ADOT limits for weight, length, width and height shall travel on a public road without a permit from ADOT. No vehicle in excess of seven-ton capacity shall travel on a publicly maintained road without a permit from the Public Works Supervisor.

(D) The Public Works Supervisor is authorized and instructed to prepare specifications, application forms, and permit forms detailing the conditions and restrictions under which the encroachment is allowed, which will include at least the following: Culvert requirements; Paving requirements on and in the vicinity of driveways; Limitations on driveway access to arterial, major collector, and minor collector streets; and Limitations on the number of driveways that may be created when parcels are divided.

(E) Any permit issued is revocable at will, should it be necessary to protect the public safety or to allow road expansion.

(F) The Public Works Supervisor is authorized and directed to charge a permit fee in an amount authorized by

the Town Council. The fee shall be specified on the permit. No utility franchised by the county under A.R.S. Title 9, Chapter 5, Articles 1.1 and 4, which pays a franchise fee based on gross sales as agreed to by the Town Council, shall be required to pay a permit fee.

(G) Emergency encroachments, including excavation for public utility repairs necessary to protect the public safety, are allowed without a permit provided a permit is applied for the next working day, all traffic control and safety devices necessary are used, and final repairs are not performed until authorized by the Public Works Supervisor.

(H) In the event an obstruction of a publicly maintained road occurs within the roadway prism without a permit so as to cause an immediate public hazard, the town may remove the obstruction and seek reimbursements of the costs involved from the responsible person(s). In all other cases, the provisions of A.R.S. § 28-7054 apply.

How the 2020 Census will invite everyone to respond

Nearly every household will receive an invitation to participate in the 2020 Census either in the mail or from a census taker.

95% of households

will receive their census invitation in the mail.

Almost 5% of households →

will receive their census invitation when a census taker drops it off. In these areas, the majority of households may not receive mail at their home's physical location (like households that use PO boxes or areas recently affected by natural disasters).



Less than 1% of households

will be counted in person by a census taker, instead of being invited to respond on their own. We do this in very remote areas like parts of northern Maine, remote Alaska, and in select American Indian areas that ask to be counted in person.

Note: We have special procedures to count people who don't live in households, such as students living in dorms, people living in nursing homes, or people experiencing homelessness.

What to expect in the mail

When it's time to respond, most households will receive an invitation in the mail. Every household will have the option of responding online, by phone, or by mail.

Depending on how likely your area is to respond online, you'll receive either an invitation encouraging you to respond online or an invitation along with a paper questionnaire.

Letter invitation

- Most areas of the country are likely to respond online, so most households will receive a letter asking them to go online to complete the census questionnaire.
- We are working with the U.S. Postal Service to stagger the delivery of these invitations over several days. This way we can spread out the number of users responding online, and we'll be able to serve you better if you need help over the phone.

Letter invitation and paper questionnaire

- Areas that are less likely to respond online will receive a paper questionnaire along with their package. The package will also include information about how to respond online or by phone.

We understand that you might miss our initial letter in the mail.

- Every household that hasn't responded will receive reminders and will eventually receive a paper questionnaire.
- If you don't respond online, by phone, or by mail, we will follow up in person.

An invitation to respond online to the 2020 Census.

(Some households will also receive paper questionnaires.)



March 16-24

A reminder letter.



March 26-April 3

A reminder postcard.



April 8-16

A reminder letter and paper questionnaire.



April 20-27

A final reminder postcard before we follow up in person.


