

RESOLUTION NO. 24-200

A RESOLUTION OF THE MAYOR AND COMMON COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF DEWEY-HUMBOLDT, COUNTY OF YAVAPAI, ARIZONA, APPROVING AND ADOPTING THE YAVAPAI COUNTY MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL HAZARD MITIGATION PLAN 2023 DATED DECEMBER 6, 2023

WHEREAS, the Town of Dewey-Humboldt, pursuant to A.R.S. § 26-308, 44 CFR §201.6 and the Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000 ("DMA2K") may adopt the Yavapai County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan (Mitigation Plan) 2023; and,

WHEREAS, in recent years, the Town of Dewey-Humboldt has experienced damage from natural and human caused hazards including, but not limited to, flooding, land/mudslides, severe wind, wildfire, and winter storms, resulting in damage to and/or loss of property and life, economic hardship and threats to public health and safety; and,

WHEREAS, the Town of Dewey-Humboldt wishes to adopt the Mitigation Plan 2023 in order to further reduce hazard risks to the community, and,

WHEREAS, the Town of Dewey-Humboldt participated in developing the Mitigation Plan 2023 which was drafted in accordance with Federal requirements and is based upon research and related work performed by the Yavapai Multi-Jurisdictional Planning Team; and

WHEREAS, the Mitigation Plan 2023's primary purposes are to: facilitate identification of hazards which potentially affect the Town of Dewey-Humboldt and its citizens; assess the vulnerability and risk posed by those hazards to community-wide human and structural assets; develop strategies for mitigation of identified hazards; establish future maintenance procedures for the Mitigation Plan 2023 and document the planning process; and

WHEREAS, the Mitigation Plan 2023 also identifies a number of mitigation actions or projects that will address specific hazards affecting the Town of Dewey-Humboldt and its residents, thereby affording further protection to both persons and property; and


WHEREAS, upon the Town of Dewey-Humboldt's approval of the Mitigation Plan 2023 and its approval by the Arizona Division of Emergency Management, Arizona Department of Emergency and Military Affairs and the Federal Emergency Management Agency, the Town of Dewey-Humboldt will be eligible to apply for federal mitigation grant funding.

WHEREAS, pursuant to FEMA requirements, jurisdictions are required to adopt a Resolution formally adopting the Plan; and,

WHEREAS, the Dewey-Humboldt Town Council desires to approve the Plan by Resolution, in order to comply with the FEMA requirements;


NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Common Council of the Town of Dewey-Humboldt, Arizona hereby adopts and approves the Yavapai County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan 2023.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

§ 32.30 NATIONAL INCIDENT MANAGEMENT SYSTEM ADOPTION.

It shall be the public policy of the Town of Dewey-Humboldt to adopt the National Incident Management System (NIMS) concept of emergency planning and unified command. It shall further be the policy of this town to train public officials responsible for emergency management.

§ 32.31 AUTHORIZATION TO PREPARE DOCUMENTS.

The Town Manager, Town Clerk, Town Attorney, and any other necessary persons are hereby authorized to prepare the agreements, forms, and instruments contemplated to be used by the town in implementing the provisions of the NIMS.

§ 32.32 MULTI-HAZARD MITIGATION PLAN.

The Dewey-Humboldt Multi-Hazard Mitigation Plan shall be adopted as follows.

(A) The Plan is hereby adopted as an official plan of the Town of Dewey-Humboldt.

(B) The Plan shall be implemented, monitored, and maintained by the officials and staff designated in the Plan for a period of five years with the support of the resolution codified herein.

(C) Future revisions and Plan maintenance actions required by the Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000 and FEMA are hereby adopted as part of the resolution codified herein for a period of five years from the date of the resolution codified herein.

§ 32.33 YAVAPAI MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL HAZARD MITIGATION PLAN.

The 2011 update of the Yavapai Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan shall be adopted to meet the requirements of the Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000 as follows.

(A) The Plan is hereby adopted because the Town of Dewey-Humboldt has experienced damage from natural and human-caused hazards, such as flooding, land/mudslides, severe wind, wildfire, and winter storms, possibly resulting in damage and/or loss of property and life, economic hardship and threats to public health and safety.

(B) The primary purpose of the Plan is to identify hazards that affect the town, assess the vulnerability and risk posed by those hazards to community-wide human and structural assets, developing strategies for mitigation of those identified hazards, present future maintenance procedures for the Plan, and document the planning process.

(C) The Plan recommends several hazard mitigation actions or projects that will provide mitigation for specific hazards that affect the town, in order to protect people and property from loss associated with those hazards.

(D) Upon approval of the Plan and approval from the Arizona Division of Emergency Management and the Federal Emergency Management Agency, the town eligible to apply for federal mitigation grant funding.
